Customer Spotlight: Joel Bailey

Joel Bailey is an NHG customer growing vegetables, raising chickens and goats, making compost and creating a sustainable, eco-friendly urban oasis in his own backyard. Many of his vegetable transplants, seeds and soils come from NHG. He is a regular at many of our free programs including "Growing Vegetables" and "Fruit Trees for the Edible Garden". NHG: How did you decide to start your backyard eco-friendly, sustainable projects?

I wanted to become more self-reliant and know where my food comes from and what's been done to it. In doing so, I have also saved money and become a better steward of the environment. Self-reliance, sustainable growing methods and being environmentally responsible all compliment each other.

NHG: What kinds of eco-friendly or sustainable projects do you have going on in your backyard right now?

The main players in our backyard ecosystem are growing veggies, chickens, ducks and Nigerian dwarf dairy goats. We collect rainwater for the animal's drinking water and plant irrigation. We compost kitchen scraps, leaves, hay, newspaper and the animal's manure.

NHG: How many chickens do you have and what is your main purpose for having them?

We currently have six chickens and two ducks. Our main purpose is for egg production and the secondary purpose is for valuable fertilizer.

NHG: Any advice you have for a newbie sustainable backyard farmer?

I suggest doing a little bit of research and then starting modestly - but the most important thing is to just start. Before two years ago, I never gardened - much less raised goats and chickens. I read some on the internet, looked at a few books and took some classes at NHG - almost all free. The feeling of walking into our house from our backyard with handfuls of fresh, delicious produce gives me great joy and satisfaction. I love our mini-urban farm!



Start Your Seeds NOW!

January is the time to start seeds of cool season veggies like broccoli, cabbage and cauliflower indoors to transplant in February. This is also the time of year we start our seeds for our spring and summer garden. **Tomato seeds** need 8 to 10 weeks to grow before transplanting in March, **peppers** and **eggplant** need around 6 to 8 weeks. Seed starter kits work well with cool season seeds and our **Germination Station** includes a **heat mat** to boost warm season seeds. In order for a seed to germinate it must receive the proper combination of moisture, temperature, light and air. Seedlings will need supplemental light as soon as they emerge. We recommend (and use!) the **Jumpstart Light Kit**. Late in February, direct sow seeds of lettuce, mustard, leafy greens and peas into the garden. Indoors, start cucumber, squash, muskmelon and watermelon to transplant after danger of frost has passed. Don't forget your **NHG Organic Veggie Food** as it's formulated for North Texas.


Happy new year! As we head into the coldest part of the year, we can warm ourselves with bright spots of colorful flowers while looking forward to the coming spring. This is the time of year when **ornamental kale**, **pansies**, and **Iceland poppies** really shine. In the shade, **cyclamen** and **primroses** brighten the view. The first of the **Paperwhite Narcissus**, **Crocus**, and early spring bulbs are beginning to emerge. **Hellebores**, **Mahonia**, and **Forsythia** display their lovely flowers in late winter. If you're looking for a way to add a little green to the view, consider adding cool season herbs such as **Dill**, **Parsley**, **Fennel**, and **Chervil**. In addition to being wonderful herbs to cook with, their fernlike foliage is a delightful foil for your winter annuals. Mulch existing planter areas and fertilize monthly with **NHG Organic Pansy Food** or **NHG Organic Bedding Food**. This is also the time to look forward and plan for spring. JANUARY

- Finish planting pre-chilled tulips and hyacinths into the garden early in the month. Plant daffodils through February. Force Paperwhites indoors
- O Plant onion sets and slips.
- **Transplant** existing trees and shrubs while their root systems are dormant.
- O Plant camellias and fruit trees.
- O Add **mid-winter color**: pansies, violas and cyclamen.
- O **Start seeds** of tomatoes, broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, lettuce, peppers and eggplant indoors mid-to later part of the month.
- O Prepare vegetable gardens with organic matter.

FEBRUARY

- O **Start seeds** of broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, lettuce, peppers, tomatoes, eggplant, cucumber, squash, carrots, muskmelon, watermelon, herb and flower seeds indoors. Direct sow seeds of English and edible pod peas and lettuce outdoors.
- O **Plant** delphinium, foxglove, diascia, alyssum, transitional color and more!
- O **Plant potatoes and asparagus**. Plant transplants of broccoli, cabbage, chard, spinach, lettuce, grape vines and berry shrubs. Now is also a great time to plant fruit trees.
- O Protect tender color, perennials, flowering shrubs and young vegetable seedlings with frost cloth during severe cold spells. Water is critical immediately prior to hard freezes to lessen cold injury.
- O **Prepare beds for spring** planting by working in compost or other organicmaterials.

It's Vegetable Planting Time!

The holidays are over, it's cold, rainy and maybe even snowy outside; that means it's time to plant **potatoes**, **asparagus**, **onion sets**, **horseradish**, and **rhubarb**. All these crops need to develop a good root system while it's cold to get them off to a good start. You can start harvesting baby potatoes 2-3 weeks after the plants start flowering in late spring or early summer. Full size potatoes will be ready at the end of summer. 'Kennebec', 'Red La Soda', and 'Yukon Gold' will be available. At the end of February look for quart pots of specialty potatoes 'Caribe', 'Red Pontiac', 'All Blue', and 'Cranberry Red'. Horseradish can be harvested in the fall. Asparagus and rhubarb have delicious, edible stems! Asparagus lovers need to be patient, you can take a small harvest a year after planting the crowns, but you'll need to wait at least 2 years for a full harvest. Rhubarb is harvested in summer and can be collected the first summer after planting the roots. *Check our Edibles page on www.nhg.com* for directions on how and when to plant. You'll also find a link on how to prepare fresh horseradish. We'll have planting demos January 15th, 22nd & 29th. Check the Events page on www.nhg.com for details.
