

Vertical Wall Planters: GroVert Living Walls

Vertical Gardening is a unique way to maximize space indoors. Each GroVert kit has its own self-watering tray to make maintenance a breeze.

DIRECTIONS

- Choose a site for your GroVert Living Wall Planter. Be sure to match the light source to the type of plants you want to add.
- Fill the "pockets" of the GroVert with **NHG Organic Potting Soil**.
- Add plants, then water with a watersoluble fertilizer, such as Hastagro, and let the plants sit for two days so they can settle in properly.
- Now attach the 10-cell GroVert planter to the frame and hang.
- To water, pour water into the irrigation tray until it is completely full. This will water the plants vertically and any excess will drain in the collection tray.

Love Your Roses on Valentine's Day!

By Carolyn Kennedy, NHG Garden Advisor Because rose plants are dormant and typically leafless in early to mid February this is the best time to do a hard pruning. If we are having an unusually warm winter, you can prune in early February. Start by removing any dead, diseased or damaged branches. Cut out twigs that are smaller than a pencil in favor of thick healthy canes. Look for branches that are rubbing together and remove the one growing toward the center of the plant.

Your goal is to create air circulation through the center of the plant. Roses respond well to yearly pruning and clean-up. Don't be daunted by this manageable task. Each spring they'll reward you with beautiful blooms.

Moderate and lower light levels: Dracaena, Pleomeles, ZZ plants,

Philodendrons, Aglonemas and a personal favorite, Sansevieria. **Color Pop!** Bromeliads and Orchids are long lasting. African

Violets and Kalanchoes cheer up any room. Ferns add texture and softness to plant displays.

INDOOR PLANT MAINTENANCE

Favorite Cool Season Plants

It's easy to forget our perennials this time of year. Favorites to plant now through February include:

- **Helleborus (Lenten Rose)**: Tough evergreen that blooms in the cooler months. Great in shady areas.
- **Rosemary**: Trailing or upright. Blue flowers attract bees. Fragrant and delicious. Evergreen.
- **Peonies**: Fantastic blooms in spring! Plant in part shade. Arrives mid-February. Feed with organic Espoma Holly-tone.
- **Ferns**: Lovely planted along-side Peonies. My favorites are Japanese Holly Fern and Autumn fern.
- Heuchera: Part shade. Mounding foliage known for its bright colors
 of chartreuse, red, black, pink and purple. Spikes of blooms in early spring.
 Great as a border!
- **Dianthus**: Pretty in rock gardens and sunny borders. Many colors.
- Creeping Phlox: Low growing companion with mounds of bright blooms.
- **Iberis (candytuft)**: White whorls of blooms that handles shadier spots. Evergreen.
- **Scabiosa**: They bloom for months and months with little care. Drought tolerant. Butterflies love it!

Around Valentine's Day, cut back frost-damaged perennials. Feed with Espoma Holly-tone for acid-loving plants and **NHG 3-2-3 Organic Fertilizer** as a general fertilizer. Start Seeds Now For Spring Success

Starting seeds indoors now means you'll have healthy transplants to set out in spring. With a proper start, you will have beautiful veggies, color, and herbs ready to transplant into the garden in about 6 to 8 weeks. You will need either a seed starting kit or some biodegradable pots, seed-starting soil, and a supplemental light. For best results, add a seedling heat mat. When your seedlings have their second and third sets of leaves, you can feed them a little HastaGro. Now is the time to plant seeds for all your favorite veggies like tomatoes, lettuce, and cilantro! This is also an excellent time to start nasturtium, hollyhocks, bachelor buttons, and other classic garden blooms. Have you ever come in looking for a hard-to-find herb transplant such as lovage, cumin, or chervil? Don't fret! Now is the time to start them indoors.

NOW is the **TIME**...



JANUARY

- Finish planting pre-chilled tulips and hyacinths into the garden early in the month. Plant daffodils through February.
 Force Paperwhites indoors
- O Plant onion sets and slips through January.
- O **Transplant** existing trees and shrubs while their root systems are dormant.
- O Plant camellias and fruit trees.
- O Add **mid-winter color**: pansies, violas and cyclamen.
- Start seeds of tomatoes early mid January indoors. Broccoli, cauliflower, cabbage, peppers and eggplant mid - late January indoors.
- O Prepare vegetable gardens with organic matter.
- O **Install** new raised vegetable and herb beds.

FEBRUARY

- Start seeds of broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, lettuce, peppers, tomatoes, eggplant, herb and flower seeds indoors. Direct sow seeds of English and edible pod peas and lettuce outdoors.
- O **Plant** delphinium, foxglove, diascia, alyssum, transitional color and more!
- O Plant potatoes, asparagus, horseradish and rhubarb. Plant transplants of broccoli, cabbage, chard, spinach, lettuce, grape vines and berry shrubs. Now is also a great time to plant fruit trees.
- O Protect tender color, perennials, flowering shrubs and young vegetable seedlings with frost cloth during severe cold spells. Water is critical immediately prior to hard freezes to lessen cold injury.
- O **Prepare beds for spring** planting by working in compost or other organic materials.
- O **Install** new raised vegetable and herb beds.

Eat the Best Veggies from Your Own Backyard!

We can grow lots of delicious vegetables beginning this month! Be sure all your veggie beds are prepared with lots of compost. And, don't forget to fertilize with NHG Organic Veggie Food.

Potatoes: Potatoes arrive in January, but are planted in February. Cut seed potatoes into pieces. Dust with sulphur then let cure for a few days. Plant in a soil and pine straw mixture. As the plants grow, mound the soil/straw mixture up the stem so there is always 4"-6" or so peeking out the top. Potatoes will form in the mounded soil/straw. Dirt pots also work well and make harvest-time easy. When the flowers are blooming, potatoes are growing! Harvest mid-late summer. More potato-growing information at www.nhg.com/pdf/PotatoPlanting.pdf

Onion/Leeks: Onion slips (small plants with no bulb) should be planted in January when they arrive in-store. Form a small hole (a pencil works great) and place the onion slip about 1"-2" into the ground. Fertilize well to encourage top growth; growth now means more bulb later. Harvest when the tops start to yellow and fall over in late summer.

Asparagus: Plant in late January through February. Asparagus like to be planted in their own space. A 4'x4' raised bed is the perfect amount of space. Feed with a quality fertilizer such as **NHG Organic 7-2-2** to help get them off to a great start.

Rhubarb: Though Rhubarb prefers the cooler climates, with a little extra attention, they'll thrive in here in North Texas. Feed this perennial edible through the growing season and harvest in mid-late summer. Consider planting in a container with a bit of afternoon shade through summer. You'll have a gorgeous plant that is also edible! Plant in February.

Horseradish: There is nothing better than fresh, HOT horseradish! Be sure you give this easy-to-grow perennial a try. Plant in February, harvest in late summer through early fall. Dig up the roots, then replant the crown of the horseradish to enjoy more fresh roots next year. Horseradish plants can grow large, so be sure to give it plenty of space in the garden.
