January - February 2015

NOW is the TIME

- **20** Start tomato seeds indoors in January! Direct-seed broccoli, Brussels sprouts and salad greens. Plant 4" transplants as available.
- No Plant any remaining tulip bulbs by early January. Add cheerful color with pansies, violas, cyclamen and other winter favorites.
- **100** Onions & leeks begin arriving in late December and are planted through January.
- **100** Potatoes arrive in late January and are planted through February. Asparagus crowns, horseradish, and rhubarb are also planted in February.
- **20** Amend existing veggie and landscape beds with compost. Now is the ideal time to add biostimulants such as Medina Soil Activator and Molasses to boost beneficial microbes for spring planting.
- Prune roses, perennials, and ornamental grasses by mid-February. Plan new rose plantings ahead of NHG's Rose Weekend March 7th-8th.
- **80** Spray horticultural dormant oils on fruit trees and shrubs to control overwintering pests such as scale.
- Now is a great time for transplanting existing shrubs and trees while they are dormant.
- w Turn compost piles and bins; continue adding new material to prepare for spring use.
- **100** Provide food and water for wild songbirds to help them get through the winter. This helps to attract them back to your garden throughout the year.

Is your soil ready for all this planting? January and February are the ideal months for soil preparation. Join special guest **Randy Johnson of the Dallas Zoo** as he presents 'Soil Biology for Gardeners' on February 7th so you can dig deep and improve your soil health before planting. Follow this with **Heather Rinaldi of Texas Worm Ranch** on February 22nd—Heather will discuss the ecological value of worms, their role in gardening, and vermicomposting, as well.

If you're brand new to gardening in north Texas or need a complete class on growing vegetables, there are classes for you, too—the **Introduction to N. Texas Landscape Gardening or Home Vegetable Gardening** classes are the perfect way to get growing this year.

Onion How-To:





Carefully tease apart the individual slips in the bunch avoiding root breakage as much as possible.



Sort the slips from largest to smallest—larger slips will go in beds for forming bulbs while smaller slips can be tucked into containers for their tasty green tops.



Make a shallow, 1" indentation with your forefinger and gently insert the slip.



Gently press the soil to secure the slip and help it stay upright.



Water lightly with organic root stimulator or a solution of liquid seaweed after planting.



Aren't all onions the same?

No! Onions are put into 3 distinct categories; short-day, intermediate-day and long-day. In north central Texas, it's best to plant short and intermediate varieties for best success. Leeks are not daylight sensitive, so that is not a factor when selecting varieties.

NHG will be offering yellow, red and white onion varieties in both short and long day categories as well as specialty onion varieties and leeks!

Short Day Onions:

Texas Supersweet Southern Belle Red White Bermuda Yellow Granex



Intermediate Day:

Super Star Candy Red Candy Apple



Potatoes

Yukon Gold Russian Fingerling Red La Soda and more.

Also in January & February:



Leeks



Horseradish



Asparagus



Potato How-To:



Select seed potatoes that are firm and have at least 2-3 'eyes' per potato (or piece)

Choose a raised bed or large container, such as these 45 gallon nursery pots.



Fill your container about 1/3 full with loose, rich soil that drains well and contains plenty of organic matter.





Space your seed potatoes about 1' apart.

Cover your seed potatoes with 3-4" of your planting mix, mixed with a



bit of pine straw to keep it loose and aerated.

After growth appears, continue adding soil every week or so depending on growth. Speak to one of our garden advisors for more information.



Vertical Mini-Landscapes

Craving a touch of green to liven up the chill of winter months indoors? These easy, low-maintenance mini gardens are the perfect creative project during gray January days. Unique air plants—tillandsias—are mounted with floral pins to a backdrop created with moss, stones, and branches. Feeling inspired? Here are the basic steps:

- 1. Find a container deep enough to hold a fitted piece of 2" Styrofoam, but light enough to easily mount on a feature wall. Simple wooden boxes like these or even a vintage cigar box will do.
- **2.** First, apply a hanger to the back. Then, cut the foam to fit tightly and secure with hot glue.
- 3. Next, adorn your blank canvas with different mosses and secure with greening pins—here, we used dyed reindeer moss to contrast with sheet moss and mood moss. There are many colors and types, so stop in to see all the possibilities.
- 4. Adding some stones and branches will give your creation depth and character. You can go for whimsical or create a more realistic-looking forest floor composition. These are easily secured with hot glue, as well.

- 5. Lastly, add a specimen tillandsia or a group of them, depending on your style. Tillandsias come in numerous shapes, sizes and colors, so check in at NHG to see the wide variety.
- 6. Hang your piece and enjoy! To care for it, simply mist the tillandsias lightly with water 2-3 times per week. Avoid placing them in hot direct sunlight and heater drafts, as this can dessicate the plants.
