- **Taxus, Podocarpus** or **Japanese Yew** are excellent evergreen screens. 10 to 15 feet tall; 6 to 8 feet wide.
- Aucuba a lovely perennial shrub. Green foliage with bright yellows spots, 8 feet tall.
- Oxalis 10"-12" mounding perennial with purple or green foliage and dainty flowers.
- **Wood Fern** and **Japanese Holly Fern** prefer moist well drained soil. 2 to 3 feet tall and wide.
- Hosta 'Frances William', 'Wide Brim' and 'Blue Angel' are known for their colorful foliage. A little bit of Sluggo will keep all your plants slug-free.
- Heuchera 'Blackout', 'Brownie', 'Pear Crisp' and Heucherella 'Gold Zebra'
   perennial known for it's foliage in a variety of colors such as lime green, peach, and deep plum. 18 to 24 inches tall.

# Architectural, Artistic Agaves, Cactus & Yuccas: Not just for desert-scapes!

Many drought tolerant agaves thrive in our hot dry summers here in North Texas weather. We have a huge selection of cool, unique and unusual varieties for your landscape. In-stock this summer:

### **AGAVES**

- **Baccarat** or **Mountain** (*Agave montana*) A 4' toothy variety with yellow blooms.
- 'Baja' (Agave 'Baja') Under 3' with very dense foliage lined with fine red teeth.
- **American** (*Agave americana*) Blue-green foliage. One of the largest-growing types available.
- 'Jaws' (Agave gentryi 'Jaws') Apple green foliage. Grows 4'. Large, stiff spines.
- **Parry's** (*Agave parryi var. parryi*) One of the most dense and compact. 2-3' x 2'-3' of tightly packed leaves.

**YUCCAS** produce one bloom stalk every summer. The bell-like flowers are fragrant at night. Will grow in partial shade conditions conditions, but thrive in full sun.

- **Spanish Dagger** (*Yuccα gloriosα*) One of the most fragrant types. Can be formed into a tree.
- Twist Leaf (Yucca rupicola) Slender, upright, curving, blue-green foliage.
- **Color Guard** (*Yucca filamentosa 'Color Guard'*) NHG Staff favorite! Compact, variegated leaves. Coral tones emerge in cooler weather.
- **Red Yucca** (*Hesperaloe parvifolia*) Curving foliage, beautiful red blooms. Close relative to yuccas and agaves.

**CACTUS** These are flat-leaved, fruiting succulents. Clumping growers.

- Prickly Pear (Opuntia engelmanii) Produces edible fruits.
- Cow's Tongue (Opuntia engelmanii var. linguiformis) Elongated, tongue-like foliage.
- **Purple Prickly Pear** (*Opuntia violacea*) Very round pads are blushed a violet purple hue that deepens in cooler weather.
- **Hairy Old Man** (*Opuntia pilifera*) Pads are covered in very fine "prickles", resembling a man's beard stubble.

## NOW is the TIME...



### JULY

- O Plant: Tomatoes early to mid-July for fall production and plant pumpkins and gourds for fall harvest. Plant peppers mid-July for fall production.
- O Fertilize: Feed container plants and roses regularly and watch for insect and disease problems. We carry a full line of rose care products, including organics.
- O Water: Water deeply when you water your established plants. Water container plants as needed; use Soil Moist or Koko Pro to retain water in the soil for container plants.
- O Pest control: Use BT for caterpillars, blast aphids with water, and release ladybugs.
- O Disease control: Spray Neem oil or potassium bicarbonate for control of black spot, powdery mildew and other fungal diseases.

### AUGUST

- O Plant: Fall-flowering bulbs, fall annuals (marigolds, zinnias, celosias) and perennials (Mexican bush sage, fall asters). Plant wildflower seeds late in the month to allow for germination and growth prior to winter. Plant beans and squash early in the month; cucumbers, broccoli, cabbage, and cauliflower about mid-month. Plant leafy crops late in August.
- O Pests: Spray horticultural oil for spider mites, lace bugs, thrips, and scale.
- O Mulch, mulch, mulch to keep in moisture and protect against harsh, hot temperatures this summer
- O Prune roses back by 10%-30% and fertilize for fall-flush of blooms.

### **DALLAS MANDATORY WATERING GUIDELINES**

March 1 to Oct. 31, watering of lawns or landscapes with an irrigation system or sprinkler is prohibited between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. Watering with a hand-held hose, drip irigation or a soaker hose is permitted at any time. Don't allow your sprinkler system to water driveways, sidewalks and streets. Do not water or irrigate lawns or landscapes during any form of precipitation. Rain/freeze sensors are now required on all irrigation systems installed on or after Jan. 1, 2002. As of January 1, 2005 all irrigation systems must be equipped with rain sensing devices and freeze gauges. Violations of these outdoor watering guidelines can now result in fines of \$250 to \$2,000 per incident. For water conservation information, call 214/670-3155.

### Fall Tomatoes Done Right!

Tomatoes require 6 or more hours of direct sunlight, well-drained soil, and consistent moisture. There are two types of tomatoes, determinate and indeterminate.

Determinate tomatoes set one heavy crop of tomatoes over a short period of time. Indeterminate plants provide smaller crops of fruit over a long season. Grow tomatoes in your garden and in containers. If you choose to grow in containers, select a determinate plant as they are usually smaller than indeterminate plants. We will have a huge selection of both heirloom tomatoes, which have great flavors and unusual colors, and hybrid tomatoes, which have improved disease resistance and hardiness.
