We will have many varieties to choose from. The following are some of my favorites. 'F. J. Lindheimer' has peach-colored, fragrant flowers on a 3-4' shrub.


'Stephen F. Austin' is a 4-6

Looking for signs of spring? There are a number of flowering shrubs that have been storing their energy throughout the cooler months just waiting for the first signs of spring to burst into color. The first are **Flowering Quince** in shades of red, coral and white and Forsythia with vibrant yellow flowers clinging to the slender branches of the shrub before their leaves have a chance to emerge. I always know that spring is really here when my Spireas 'Bridal Wreath' and 'Reeves Double' start to bloom with cascades of white flowers covering their gracefully arching branches. Loropetalum with magenta fringe-like flowers, Viburnums with their large clusters of snowy white flowers and Indian Hawthorne with either pink or white flowers will all help you shed the grays of winter and welcome spring. A discussion of spring flowering shrubs would not be complete without mentioning the ever popular **Rose** (for sun) and **Azalea** (for shade). HOT NOW! Echinacea

Echinacea purpurea, better known as purple coneflower, is a long-time staple in the Texas Garden. All Echinacea prefer full sun and excellent drainage. Provide consistent moderate moisture in summer months, especially during their first year in the ground. Here are a few of our favorites we're bringing in with YOU in mind!

'Hot Papaya' Double orange coneflowers. Showy blooms appear in early summer, producing highly fragrant, spicy red-orange flowers.

'Firebird' Sports dark red cones and creamy red petals on large, sturdy blooms.

'**Pink Poodle**' Bright pink pom poms of blooms rise above sturdy green stems. Very unique!

'Mama Mia' The flowers on this plant evolve from red to orange to coral to pink. Blooms late-spring into summer.

Tomato Soup' The brightest red coneflower so far. Blooms are large! Up to 3.5" with good lasting power.

Even Cheesier' Pair with 'Tomato Soup'! Large bright yellow blooms are a standout.

Secret Desire' Blooms are multi-colored with shades of coral, soft orange and pink.

Summer Sky' Huge 5" flowers combine both a light orange and rose color. The long lasting flowers are held on dark stems that are very stout and very fragrant. Great cut flower.

There are so many beautiful coneflowers to try in your garden, More in stock through spring such as 'Hot Lava', 'Green Eyes', 'Secret Romance', 'Green Jewel', 'Flame Thrower', 'Harvest Moon' and the list goes on.

Spotlight on Spring Color

The days are getting longer, the nights are getting shorter, and spring flowers have arrived at NORTH HAVEN GARDENS. Now is the time to turn up the heat in your containers and perennial borders. Combine the hot pinks and corals of **Geranium 'Maverick'** with the vivid blooms of **Diascia** and **Calibrachoa**. Pair the cool blues of **Delphinium** with **Lobelia 'Techno Heat'**, **Ageratum**, and scented **Sweet Alyssum**. Herbs and veggies make wonderful foliage companions for spring color. **Sage**, **Thyme**, and **Mint** add interest to your containers, while the architectural foliage of **Cardoons** and **Artichokes** compliment any border. For those of you blessed with shade, now is the time to establish **Begonias** for summer-long color. Complete the color spectrum with the bright colors of **Impatiens**. All flowers appreciate well-prepared, amended soil, so work in that **compost** and **expanded shale**! Fertilize when planting and once each month with **NHG Organic Bedding Food** to keep your color luxuriant and fresh.









NOW is the **TIME**...



- O Select rose bushes the weekend of MARCH 5th & 6th during NHG'S ROSE WEEKEND. Ask the local rose societies and vendors for the best advice and newest varieties.
- O Plant ornamental trees, shrubs, roses, perennials, herbs, cool-season vegetables and annuals like geraniums, petunias, snapdragons and alyssum.
- O Plant begonias now for best results.
- O Plant tomatoes, peppers and tender herbs after the last frost.
- O Fertilize now if you didn't do it in February. Use root stimulator on all new plantings.
- O Repot and fertilize water garden plants with tablet fertilizers made for that use.
- O Prune fruit trees before bud break. Wait to prune spring-flowering shrubs and vines after flowering.
- O Purchase caladium bulbs for the best selection. Plant in May. Store them in a cool dry location until planting time.
- O Cutback groundcover early in the month to remove winter damage.
- O Spray for pests on fruit trees. Use BT for caterpillars, or release Green Lacewings and Trichogramma wasps to control aphids, mites, thrips, and caterpillars. Treat fire ant mounds with bait early in the morning or later in the afternoon when ants begin to forage.
- O Fertilize lawn. NHG 21-7-14 or Texas Tee are both great fertilizers.

APRIL

- O Plant warm season annuals and vegetables; summer and fall flowering perennials. Repot houseplants.
- O Fertilize summer flowering shrubs.
- O Order custom created Spring Flowering Gift Baskets from the NHG floral department to give as Easter Gifts.
- O Spray for fruit tree pests and black spot on roses. Watch for aphids on new growth. Spray with insecticidal soap or release Ladybugs. Use slug and snail bait or set out beer traps, if needed. Release beneficial nematodes to control ticks, fleas, chiggers, and fire ants.
- O Fertilize now if you didn't do it in February. Use root stimulator on all new plantings.

Treating Spring Pests the Organic Way

Now is the time to watch for aphids, slugs, caterpillars and other pests. For more info, check out our **Organic A-Z handout** available on the **Garden Solutions page at www.nhg.com**. Not sure what pest you have? Bring us a leaf sample or close-up photo for diagnosis. Most stressed plants can make a full recovery if the problem is diagnosed early.

MONTHLY

Sluggo: kills snails and slugs around vegetables, hostas, ornamentals and lawns. Its pet-safe granule remains effective after rain or sprinkling.

Green Light Yard Safe Cedar Granules: repel mosquitoes, ants, chiggers, fleas and other pests. I scatter it around my garden paths, entryways and all the areas we gather in our yard.

Release **Ladybugs**, **Green lacewings** and **trichogamma wasps** every month through fall. Set out **Praying Mantis** eggs when the weather warms in late March.

EVERY 2 WEEKS

I start using **Mosquito Bits** in our birdbath, down spouts, French drain and moist areas of our yard. This kills mosquitoes before they can mature. Also, I use preventative applications of:

- Spinosad Can be used on ornamental and edible crops as a broad spectrum treatment.
- Thuricide Use to kill caterpillars where needed.
- Neem Oil Use on roses and ornamentals to control insects, mites and fungus.

Increase your preventative spraying to once a week when the soil temperatures reach 70 degrees or above (around Mother's Day).

WEEKLY

Spray **mosquito repellent** around the yard every week. Use a **Skeeter Screen** diffuser on outdoor tables for extra defense.

Insecticidal soap: bring along during your plant inspections for safely controlling soft-bodied insects like thrips, whiteflies, mealy bugs, aphids and spider mites.
