Drought Tolerant Shrubs to Get You Through Summer

This past summer's record heat caused many of us to lose some important shrubs. Foundation shrubs are integral to our landscapes and help prevent foundation repairs. Planting shrubs with low water requirements now will mean less long-term care. The shrubs we are recommending are all are drought tolerant once established, and take full sun to a bit of shade. Be sure to visit us this spring to see all our wonderful heat hardy shrubs.

Nandina & Abelia: there's a reason they're old standbys (or retro, as we like to call them) - they are tough! Plus, there are now many new varieties to choose from such as Nandina 'Blush' and Abelia 'Twist of Lime'

Althea (Rose of Sharon) bloom heavy through late spring and early summer and come in a variety of colors.

Barberry: We are excited about all the new varieties now available! They come in a variety of sizes, but all will offer incredible toughness and gorgeous foliage color. Check out 'Orange Rocket', 'Tiny Gold' and more.

Dwarf Pomegranate Offers golden fall color and large, ornamental fruit.

Crape Myrtle: A north Texas favorite for beautiful blooms and fall color, they come in a variety of colors, sizes and shapes.

Looking for something a bit different? Plant ornamental grasses! Pennisetum 'Hameln', Dwarf Pampas Grass and Muhlenbergia capillaris (Pink or Gulf Muhly) are a few favorites.

Yucca, Salvia greggii, and the popular Red Yucca are all excellent, sculptural, drought tolerant plants.

Texas Sage 'Desperado': This silvery foliaged shrub has purple flowers were some of our favorites through last summer's heat.

Texas Mountain Laurel, my favorite, has sweet grape-scented flowers and evergreen leaves.



Heat Tolerant Perennials

There are so many varieties of heat and drought tolerant plants for sun or shade. Many will even attract butterflies and hummingbirds with their beautiful flowers and lovely scents. Here are a few of my favorites but come into the nursery to find many more.



SUN

- Achillea sp. (Yarrow) Fern-like leaves with domed flowers that come in an array of colors such as terra cotta, spicy red, pale pink and white
- Agastache sp. (Hummingbird mint or Hyssop) Colors range from orange and hot pink to true blue or white. Blooms all summer. Very attractive to many species of insects and hummingbirds.
- Melampodium sp. (Blackfoot daisy) Low-growing, bushy, native perennial. Lovely as a border plant, or spilling over the edge of a planter box. Blooms white, daisy-like flowers from May to November.
- Rudbeckia sp. (Blackeyed Susan) Comes in shades of yellow and orange to russet, bronze and mahogany tones. The flowers are daisy-like and can be single, semi-double or fully double.
- Penstemon tenuis (Brazos or Gulf coast Penstemon) Attracts hummingbirds and butterflies. Shiny evergreen leaves and 18" stalks with tubular blue-purple flowers from May to November.

SHADE

- Malvaviscus (Turk's cap) Red, white or pink flowers. It's a hummingbird favorite. Will also take part sun.
- Rivinia humilis (Pigeonberry) I have this sweet little plant on the east side of my house. Perennial herb about I foot tall that grows beneath trees and shrubs. Pink flowers and red berries. Good source of food for birds.
- Salvia roemeriana (Cedar Sage) It's scalloped leaves and intense crimson blooms are as eye-catching in pots as they are tucked into any shade/part shade garden.

Spring Vegetable Gardens by Robin Carlton, NHG Garden Advisor

Spring is the time to plant your favorite home grown veggies. Right now, we're planting tomatoes, bell and hot peppers, honeydew melons, zucchini, yellow crookneck squash, eggplant and more. For the best start, plant our transplants into your prepared beds or containers, and water in well. Be sure to apply **NHG Organic Herb Food** at planting, and reapply as directed throughout the growing season. Bi-weekly applications of Hasta Gro liquid fertilizer will increase production, and help repel garden pests. A Peony in Bloom... Makes Everyone Swoon!

Large billowing flowers open in spring time in a range of pinks, coral-peach tones, deep reds and creamy whites. Many have a lovely, bright yellow center. Stunning and long-lived specimen plants in the garden, the blooms are excellent for cutting. Distinctive foliage is another desirable attribute of peonies after the flowers have finished. Peonies are available at NHG in early spring and can be successfully planted while mostly dormant with new shoots emerging. Before planting, soil should be amended with compost or composted cow manure. Fertilize regularly with **organic Espoma Holly-tone**® to balance soil pH. **Wire peony rings** provide support to the heavy flowers. To thrive in the extremes of Texas, an ideal location is an eastern exposure, which provides a good amount of morning sun as well as shade from the afternoon heat. *Peonies are limited in quantity so be sure to come in and choose your favorite colors early.*







6 Roses You Need to Plant this Spring

Roses are a wonderful addition to any garden! There are many drought tolerant, disease tolerant that will perform exceptionally well here in North Texas. We have more than 200 varieties in stock beginning with **Spring Rose Festival March 3rd-4th**. Here are a handful of staff favorites to get you started:

'Julia Child' bountiful sunny yellow blooms spring and fall, and the delicious fruit and licorice fragrance. Floribunda.

'Easy Does It' visually striking with ruffled blooms spring and fall that begin peachy orange, fading into shades of apricot, mauve, and copper. Floribunda.

'Mister Lincoln' is truly one of the most outstanding hybrid teas. Blooms of velvety red will fill your home with a strong, classic rose aroma. Blooms spring and fall. Remarkably disease resistant.

'Home Run' Blooms throughout the growing season, and the bright yellow stamens attract pollinators. 'Pink Home Run' also available. Shrub Rose.

'Climbing Iceberg' Grace a trellis, arbor or fence with these abundant, white blooms. Has a mild honey fragrance. Climbing Floribunda.

'Drift Series' Great for smaller gardens or in pots. this is a tough group of ground cover roses. Choose apricot, coral, peach, red, white, or pink. Blooms spring through mid-summer and repeats in fall.

NOW is the TIME...



- Select rose bushes the weekend of MARCH 3rd & 4th during NHG'S ROSE WEEKEND. Ask the local rose societies and vendors for the best advice and newest varieties.
- O Plant ornamental trees, shrubs, roses, perennials, herbs, cool-season vegetables and annuals like geraniums, petunias, snapdragons and alyssum.
- O Plant begonias now for best results.
- O Plant tomatoes, peppers and tender herbs after the last frost.
- O Fertilize now if you didn't do it in February. Use root stimulator on all new plantings.
- O Repot and fertilize water garden plants with tablet fertilizers made for that use.
- O Prune fruit trees before bud break. Wait to prune spring-flowering shrubs and vines after flowering.
- O Purchase caladium bulbs for the best selection. Plant in May. Store them in a cool dry location until planting time.
- O Cutback groundcover early in the month to remove winter damage.
- O Spray for pests on fruit trees. Use BT for caterpillars, or release Green Lacewings and Trichogramma wasps to control aphids, mites, thrips, and caterpillars. Treat fire ant mounds with bait early in the morning or later in the afternoon when ants begin to forage.
- O Fertilize lawn. NHG 21-7-14 or NEW NHG Organic 7-2-2 are both great fertilizers. Check out our new menu of NHG Organic Lawn & Garden Foods in-store now!

APRIL

- O Plant warm season annuals and vegetables; summer and fall flowering perennials. Repot houseplants.
- O Fertilize summer flowering shrubs.
- O Order custom created Spring Flowering Gift Baskets from the NHG floral department to give as Easter Gifts.
- O Spray for fruit tree pests and black spot on roses. Watch for aphids on new growth. Spray with insecticidal soap or release Ladybugs. Use slug and snail bait or set out beer traps, if needed. Release beneficial nematodes to control ticks, fleas, chiggers, and fire ants.
- O Fertilize now if you didn't do it in February. Use root stimulator on all new plantings.

Organic Critter Control!

Now is the time to get ahead of the pests in our gardens that devour our plants, dig in our beds and chew holes in our leaves.

- **Bt (Bacillus thurengiensis)** apply weekly to erradicate caterpillars on edible plants.
- **Treat fire ant mounds** with bait early in the morning or late in the afternoon when ants begin to forage. We also offer a liquid mound drench that kills on contact. Great for getting rid of ants in your potted plants.
- **Sluggo** Eliminates snails and slugs. Use granules monthly. Safe to use around pets and wildlife. Growing hostas? Sluggo is a must!
- Green Lacewings and Trichogramma wasps control aphids, mites, thrips and caterpillars.
- Ladybugs have a huge appetite for aphids and are a lovely addition to our gardens.
- Beneficial Nematodes control ticks, fleas, fire ants and chiggers.
- We have an organic orchard spray for fruit tree pests and **organic Rose Defense** for spider mites, aphids, black spot and powdery mildew on roses.
- **Spinosad** is an effective chewing insect killer. Apply to fruiting vegetables, leafy and tuberous vegetables, stone fruits, citrus trees and lawns.
- Add Mosquito Dunks or Bits monthly to rain barrels, French drains, bird baths and
 anywhere you have standing water. Apply Mosquito Beater weekly to kill mosquitoes
 on contact. Or, Cedarcide or ready-to-use spray to repel them. Finally, I begin a monthly
 scattering of Yardsafe Cedar-coated Granules over my walkways, seating areas, porches
 and hammock area. This repels fleas, ticks, chiggars, flies and those pesky mosquitos!
