Ravishing Roses

Have you ever longed to grow roses but felt they would require too much maintenance? Think again! There's a huge selection of easy-care cultivars that require little more than regular fertilization, and a quick pruning each year in February and August. Once established, roses are extremely drought tolerant plants, needing watering just once per week through most of the year, twice per week in the heat of summer. Many bloom in both spring and fall, are vibrantly colored and fragrant. Our stock is carefully chosen from the best varieties for our unique climate, so choose with confidence. You'll want to get your rose gloves, your **NHG**

Organic Rose Food, and a nice pair of pruners when you purchase your plants. Feed them once a month March through October. Good choices for first time rose growers are 'Mr. Lincoln' (red Hybrid Tea), 'Belinda's Dream' (soft pink, Earthkind™), 'Don Juan' (red Climber), 'Scentimental' (red and white striped Floribunda), 'Fragrant Cloud' (orange Hybrid Tea), and 'King's Ransom' (yellow Hybrid Tea). Plant with Vital Earth Ready Rose Mix, then water in with Nature's Guide Root Stimulator. Topdress with shredded hardwood or cedar mulch. Healthy Soil Grows Healthy Plants

To grow healthy roots and vigorous plants, rich organic soil full of microbial activity and flush with nutrients is a must! Here in North Texas we have heavy, clay soil that needs amending prior to planting. By amending the soil, you'll improve drainage, increase microbial activity, and create looser soil that is easier to plant in. A simple blend of compost, **Soil Menders Garden Soil Builder**, expanded shale, and composted manure will greatly improve the health of your existing soil. Add lava sand and greensand to further improve moisture control and provide micro-nutrients. Green sand also increases nutrient content of the soil. Once you've added your soil, be sure to mix well with a garden fork if in a raised bed, or turn in to the top 6"-12" of an existing landscpe bed. Speak with a NHG Garden Advisor about exact ratios you'll need for new or existing beds.

Don't forget to topdress with mulch, even if you do not intend to plant right away. This will prevent weeds from returning to claim your patch of ground. Pine straw makes an excellent mulch or pathway material for veggies and acid-loving plants. Cedar and hardwood mulches are great for all landscape plantings, including vegetable gardens.



FAVORITE Native & Adapted Plants for Spring

Redbud Cercis canadensis Early-blooming pink Redbuds are the perfect small tree for sun to part sun areas.

Blackfoot Daisy Melampodium leucanthemum

Tough, full sun, long lasting blooms, and sweet, honey scent.

Four-nerve Daisy Hymenoxys acaulis I' yellow flowering mound, with great blooms in spring and fall. Requires excellent drainage.

Phlox Phlox divaricata Low-growing plant perfect for morning sun rock gardens. Prefers moist soil.

Winecup *Callirhoe involuerata* Mounding, low-growing, magenta blooms through early spring. Prefers good drainage, and can take a drought.

Sundrops *Calylophus drummondii* Great in full sun, bright yellow primrose-like blooms. Wonderful in the rock garden.

Oxalis Oxalis spp. Tried and true! Enjoy fresh, new color variations. Low plants for part shade borders and woodland gardens. Also good in containers.

Spring Obedient Plant *Physostegia virginiana*For sunnier, moist areas, accepts poor drainage, attracts bees, and is even a lovely cut flower.

Gulfcoast Penstemon Penstemon tennuis

A great early bloomer with pinky-lavender bell shaped blooms for moist shade areas.

Autumn Sage Salvia greggii Variety of colors, attracts butterflies, very tolerant of many types of soils- especially dry ones! Fall blooming.

Some more atypical natives that I always love to see in the landscape include:

Spider Lily Hymenocallis liriosme Texas tough! Fragrant, up to 2' high, it will take tougher areas that are damp. Pair with Penstemon.

Spiderworts *Tradeseantia app.* Unusual flowers on grassy plants in white and other colors. Great for a naturalized area.











NOW is the **TIME**...



- O Select rose bushes the weekend of MARCH 2nd & 3rd during NHG'S ROSE WEEKEND. Ask the local rose societies and vendors for the best advice and newest varieties.
- O Plant ornamental trees, shrubs, roses, perennials, herbs, cool-season vegetables and annuals like geraniums, petunias, snapdragons and alyssum.
- O Plant begonias now for best results.
- O Plant tomatoes, peppers and tender herbs after the last frost.
- O Fertilize now if you didn't do it in February. Use root stimulator on all new plantings.
- O Repot and fertilize water garden plants with tablet fertilizers made for that use.
- O Prune fruit trees before bud break. Wait to prune spring-flowering shrubs and vines after flowering.
- O Purchase caladium bulbs for the best selection. Plant in May. Store them in a cool dry location until planting time.
- O Cutback groundcover early in the month to remove winter damage.
- O Spray for pests on fruit trees. Use BT for caterpillars, or release Green Lacewings and Trichogramma wasps to control aphids, mites, thrips, and caterpillars. Treat fire ant mounds with bait early in the morning or later in the afternoon when ants begin to forage.
- O Fertilize lawn. NHG 21-7-14 or NEW NHG Organic 7-2-2 are both great fertilizers. Check out our new menu of NHG Organic Lawn & Garden Foods in-store now!

APRIL

- O Plant warm season annuals and vegetables; summer and fall flowering perennials. Repot houseplants.
- O Fertilize summer flowering shrubs.
- O Order custom created Spring Flowering Gift Baskets from the NHG floral department to give as Easter Gifts.
- O Spray for fruit tree pests and black spot on roses. Watch for aphids on new growth. Spray with insecticidal soap or release Ladybugs. Use slug and snail bait or set out beer traps, if needed. Release beneficial nematodes to control ticks, fleas, chiggers, and fire ants.
- O Fertilize now if you didn't do it in February. Use root stimulator on all new plantings.

Snazzy Spring Color!

Spring color has arrived! Shade or sun, we have great choices for containers and the landscape.

First, start off with great soil. Either see our suggestions for amending your beds, or add our premium **NHG Organic Potting Soil** to containers. Once you've planted, feed all your seasonal color regularly with **NHG Organic Bedding Food**. Here are some of my favorite color suggestions I offer all my Garden Coach Clients.

Color in Shade: Perennials such as Ferns, Columbine, Hellebores and Hederas are excellent companions to Coleus, Green Leaf Begonias, and Impatiens.

Color in Sun: Ornamental Chard, Coleus, Celosia, Stock, Calendula, Marigold, Zinnias, Larkspur and Lantana. The most fun part is visiting North Haven Gardens to choose your favorite colors. Match color themes to your home, your favorite palette, or be inspired by a favorite place in the world.

Shade Combo: Try Aspidistra with Variegated Hedera and white Impatiens or Green Leaf Begonias. If the shade is bright enough add fragrant Sweet Alyssum.

Sun Combos: Try Swiss Chard 'Bright Lights' with Golden Lemon Thyme, Nasturtiums, and Calendula. Or, fill colorful containers with English Daisy, Petunias and Sweet Alyssum.

When amending beds, remember that adding plenty of organic compost can solve many soil issues, be it drainage, compaction, pH or lack of fertility. If you are uncertain as to what type of soil your plant likes, speak to a NHG Garden Advisor.
