

Fabulous Foliage!

Wondering what to do with that spot under the shade tree where even St. Augustine grass won't grow? Plant Hostas! Hostas are lush, shade-loving perennials which come in a variety of sizes and color. We have a huge selection of Hostas including our newest favorite **Hosta 'Guacamole'** with it's avocado green leaves and deep veins...this one's a beauty! **Hosta 'Albo Marginata'** has green leaves with white leaf margins and pale lavender blooms; **'Golden Tiara'** produces lavender blooms above pale green leaves with chartreuse margins; **'Medio Variegata'** has unique, twisted, lance-shaped leaves with creamy centers edged with light and dark green streaks; **'Patriot'** is a favorite with frosty blue-green leaves and lavender flowers; and undoubtedly the king of the Hosta garden has to be **'Royal Standard'** with its sweetly-scented, white blooms dancing above bright green leaves creating a mound up to 2ft high and 4ft wide. For small, shady spots and containers Hosta **'Mouse Ears'** is an excellent choice as it only grows to 8" high and up to 12". *Be sure to sprinkle Sluggo at the base of each plant to keep the snails at bay*.

DALLAS MANDATORY WATERING GUIDELINES

April 1 to Oct. 31, watering of lawns/landscapes with an irrigation system or sprinkler is prohibited 10am-6pm. Watering with a hand-held hose or a soaker hose is permitted at any time. Don't allow your sprinkler system to water driveways, sidewalks and streets. Do not water or irrigate lawns/landscapes during any form of precipitation. Rain/freeze sensors are required on all irrigation systems installed on or after Jan. 1, 2002. As of Jan. 1, 2005 all irrigation systems must be equipped with rain sensing devices and freeze gauges. Violations of these guidelines can result in fines of \$250-\$2,000 per incident. For water conservation information, call 214-670-3155.



My Favorite Drought Tolerant Plants

My favorite summer plants are not only colorful, but are usually xeric (low water) and attract beneficial insects, butterflies and birds. Plus, they're often natives or adapted, so they're tough plants you only plant once. Some of my favorites include...

- **Anisacanthus**, a small shrub with red blooms that the hummingbirds love.
- **Red Yucca** has salmon-red blossoms held high above a soft, grassy form.
- **Copper Canyon Daisy** is a large, fragrant-leaved plant with bright yellow blossoms.
- Zexmenia is a super tough wildflower that seems to be always in bloom.
- Damianita, Skullcap and Katie's Ruellia provide low mounding color with lots of blooms through spring, summer and fall.

Until these perennials get established, I like to just pop out what is fading from spring and add summer annuals such as **Zinnia** or **Purslane**. Both also attract bees. *Come visit us at the garden*



CHILE D'ARBOL

- 8 dried Chile de Arbol (qty depends on how hot you like it!)
- 1/16 of a fresh white onion
- Fresh garlic

 (1 raw clove is good)
- 10 Tomatillos (husked & boiled)
- 1/2 bunch of cilantro
- Tsp Salt or to taste
- Boil the chilies and tomatillos until soft.
 Transfer to a blender and add the other remaining ingredients. Blend together.
 Add limes at the end for extra flavor. Wonderful served over eggs or on tacos.

- O **Plant** caladium bulbs and summer bedding plants such as lantana, marigolds, purslane and zinnia; perennials, herbs, warm-season vegetables.
- Missed your spring planting of tomatoes? Start seeds for Fall tomato harvest. Plant transplants of eggplant, peppers and okra and direct seed black-eyed peas and okra
- O **Fertilize** tomatoes, annual flowers and potted plants, and azaleas after blooming. Use root stimulator on all new plantings. Add compost and slow-release fertilizer to new planting beds.
- O **Prune** spring-flowering shrubs, vines and climbing roses after they are finished flowering.
- Pest Control: Use BT for caterpillars, blast aphids with water and release ladybugs; use horticultural oil or insecticidal soap for thrips, scale, spider mites, and mealybugs.
- O **Disease Control**: Spray Neem oil, Plant Wash and Serenade Garden for control of black spot, powdery mildew and other fungal diseases.

JUNE

- Father's Day is around the corner! Make sure the kids know you want top quality tools and a gift card from North Haven Gardens!
- O **Plant** warm-season annuals such as periwinkle, copper plant, vegetables, tropicals, fall-flowering perennials; re-pot houseplants.
- O **Vegetables**: Begin harvesting tomatoes from spring planting. Keep tomato plants watered consistently to prevent cracking of the fruit. Harvest bush beans, peppers and summer herbs such as basil, oregano, sage and chives.
- O **Fertilize** summer-flowering plants; potted plants.
- O **Pests**: Spray horticultural oil or Spinosad for spider mites, lace bugs, thrips, and scale.
- O **Mulch, mulch, mulch** to keep in moisture and protect against harsh, hot temperatures this summer.
- O Watering: Use Gator-Bags to help keep newly planted trees and shrubs properly watered. Water established plants deeply and infrequently. Established lawns, shrubs and trees will need a deep watering about once per week. Do not rely on your sprinkler system to adequately water new plantings. Provide supplemental hand watering to new plants several times a week, as needed. Early morning, between 6am-8am is best. Watering in the evening encourages fungal diseases in your turf, ornamental and vegetable plantings.

Organic Mosquito & Flea Control

Now is the time to focus on warm weather entertaining, not biting bugs. Start early to get the best results!

- **Beneficial Nematodes** are microscopic worms that attack soil-dwelling insects (like fleas and grubs) without harming plants. Simply mix with water and spray on lawn. Release at dusk and keep the soil moist to keep them thriving.
- An organic repellent for fleas and mosquitoes is a monthly application of **Yard Safe Cedar-coated Granules** anywhere you, or your pets, walk in the garden.
- Other pleasant scented repellents include Skeeter Screen reed diffusers and Yard Safe Cedarcide or Citronella spray.
- Use **mosquito dunks** monthly or **mosquito bits** every two weeks to kill mosquito larvae. This biological mosquito control can be used in water gardens, flower pots, French drains and bird baths but won't hurt the squirrels or birds.

Succulent Squash by Christine Hensley, NHG Staff, TCNP

We are so lucky that we live in North Texas! It means we can plant edibles 12 months a year. In May, we love to plant squash. What we call summer squash is harvested as immature fruit, and winter squash is harvested as mature fruit. Zucchini, yellow squash, and patty pan are all types of summer squash. Butternut, acorn, and spaghetti are all types of winter squash. Plant both types of squash in May because they need the warm temperatures of summer to produce fruit. Squash, like almost all vegetables, requires full sun, consistent moisture, and good drainage. The most common issue with squash is mildew, which can occur in cool humid weather and treated is with potassium bicarbonate. Squash vine borers and squash bugs, also common pests, can be treated with applications of spinosad. Other yummy vegetable transplants available now include peppers, okra and eggplant. And don't forget! It's always a good time to plant herbs. Summer favorites include Basil, Mint (for Mojitos!), rosemary and lavender.
