Summer Shrubs & Small Trees

In our **March-April 2012 Newsletter** (you can see it at **www.nhg.com**), we told you about some of our favorite heat hardy perennials. Now let's talk about shrubs and small trees. Our September-October newsletter will feature drought hardy trees to plant in fall. Visit the store to see our entire selection of recommendations for your summer garden.

Vitex – This quick growing, small tree offers very pretty spikes or purple flowers through summer. Very drought tolerant. Full sun.

Barberry – 'Crimson Pygmy', 'Lime Glow', 'Orange Rocket', and 'Sun Joy Gold Pillar'. Varieties range from bright cherry red to electric lime green. Spectacular spring, summer and fall color. Full sun.

Rose 'Valentine' – Most of our roses in-stock thrive through the summer heat with many blooming again in fall. We love '**Valentine**' because of it's large, deep red blooms. Full sun.


- **I. Select a site and make it ready!** Herbs must have at least 6 hours of sun. Amend soil with **expanded shale** and **lava sand** to improve drainage; organic **compost** to stimulate microbial activity.
- **2. Select, plant and care for your favorite herbs. Basil** is always on the top of the list. We offer a huge selection of wonderful varieties including Sweet, Genovese, Thai, Purple, and Lemon Basil. Every proper herb garden must have Chives, Parsley, Sage, Rosemary, and Thyme. Mexican Mint Marigold is an excellent substitute for tarragon in summer.

Herbs are happy in pots as well as in the ground. Our favorite soil for container gardens is **NHG Premium Organic Potting Soil**. Fertilize with **NHG Organic Herb and Veggie Food**. **Top dress with mulch to hold in moisture**. Growing Mediterranean herbs such as lavender, oregano, or sage? Colorful flowers lift your spirits and express a message to visitors that you care about your home. Brighten up your containers and flower beds with beautiful blooms that, with proper care, will flourish from summer through fall.

Sun Gardens: My favorites include the reliable **Vinca**, a.k.a. Periwinkle, in both upright and trailing forms. **Zinnias** provide sunny hues and prevail in summer temperatures. Less well known, but equally gorgeous and heat tolerant, **Angelonia** flower spikes add height to containers. Of course, **Alamanda**, **Esperanza**, **Hibiscus**, **Bougainvillea** and **Plumbago** are festive tropicals planted in the garden or in colorful pots on sunny patios and especially around the pool and water features.

Shade Gardens: Update the look of shade-loving favorites like green leafed **Begonias** and **Impatiens**, by combining them with interesting foliage plants such as **Persian Shield**, and **Coleus** for height and contrast. Consider using tropical house plants, often grown only indoors, as lush accents to the shaded patio through summer.

Thorough watering is imperative to your success this summer. 2"-3" of mulch will help retain water and cool soil temperatures. By adding amendments such as expanded shale and organic compost will prepare your garden to withstand extreme temperatures. Feed through the season with **NHG Organic Bedding Food**.



Ornamental Grasses for Summer & Beyond!

Ornamental grasses are the perfect landscape plants. They give you vertical structure, lovely water-like movement in your garden, and the subtle sound of rustling leaves. They are ecologically and resource friendly too since they require far less water (after becoming established), fertilizer, and maintenance than most other plants. Grasses that are native to North Texas are also perfect habitats for beneficial insects and provide birds with seeds, nesting materials and shelter. Most will bloom and turn lovely colors in the fall. Many grasses prefer full sun and very quick draining soil; amend with organic compost and expanded shale. Some of our favorites include:

Gulf Muhly (Muhlenbergia capillaris) In fall, this native stops traffic with it's feathery, pink foliage! Best planted en masse. I.5-3 ft. tall perennial grass with a large, airy, seed head up to half as long as the entire plant. Full Sun.

Inland Sea Oats (Chasmanthium latifolium) 2-4 ft., clump-forming, native perennial grass bearing large, oat-like flower spikes from slender, arching branches. The blue-green, bamboo-like leaves often turn a bright yellow-gold, especially in sunnier sites, in fall. This grass can handle more water than most and likes shade to part shade conditions.

Little Bluestem (*Schizachyrium scoparium***)** A very ornamental bunchgrass with fine-textured foliage that forms very dense mounds 18-24 in. tall. Slender, blue-green stems, appearing in August, reach 3 ft. by September and become radiant mahogany-red with white seed tufts in the fall. Color remains nearly all winter. Full sun to part shade.

- O Leave lots of hints around the house about **Mother's**Day gifts you are hoping for—an NHG Gift Card, roses, garden inspired jewelry and home accessories, fountains and more.
- Plant caladium bulbs and summer bedding plants such as lantana, marigolds, purslane and zinnia; perennials, herbs, warm-season vegetables.
- O Missed your spring planting of tomatoes? **Start seeds for Fall tomato harvest.** Plant transplants of eggplant, peppers and okra and direct seed black-eyed peas and okra.
- O **Fertilize** tomatoes, annual flowers and potted plants, and azaleas after blooming. Use root stimulator on all new plantings. Add compost and slow-release fertilizer to new planting beds.
- O **Prune** spring-flowering shrubs, vines and climbing roses after they are finished flowering.
- Pest Control: Use BT for caterpillars, blast aphids with water and release ladybugs; use horticultural oil or insecticidal soap for thrips, scale, spider mites, and mealybugs.
- O **Disease Control**: Spray Neem oil, Plant Wash and Serenade Garden for control of black spot, powdery mildew and other fungal diseases.

J U N E

- O **Plant** warm-season annuals such as periwinkle, copper plant, vegetables, tropicals, fall-flowering perennials; re-pot houseplants.
- O Vegetables: Begin harvesting tomatoes from spring planting. Keep tomato plants watered consistently to prevent cracking of the fruit. Harvest bush beans, peppers and summer herbs such as basil, oregano, sage and chives.
- O Fertilize summer-flowering plants; potted plants.
- O **Pests**: Spray horticultural oil or Spinosad for spider mites, lace bugs, thrips, and scale.
- O **Mulch, mulch, mulch** to keep in moisture and protect against harsh, hot temperatures this summer.
- O Watering: Use Gator-Bags to help keep newly planted trees and shrubs properly watered. Water established plants deeply and infrequently. Established lawns, shrubs and trees will need a deep watering about once per week. Do not rely on your sprinkler system to adequately water new plantings. Provide supplemental hand watering to new plants several times a week, as needed. Early morning, between 6am-8am is best. Watering in the evening encourages fungal diseases in your turf, ornamental and vegetable plantings.

Keep Your Garden Green: Water the Right Way

With the extreme heat and drought last year, would you believe the majority of stressed plants I saw were from over watering?!? And to that I tell you, "You can't make up for heat with water". Plants breathe in the top few inches of soil. When they are breathing they are kicking off new growth, developing fruit and flowers, or defending themselves against pests and diseases. Too dry? Plants shrivel up. Too wet? They won't get oxygen to their tips and so begin to droop. Our initial reaction to drooping is to give them more water. Allow your plants to dry out two inches between each watering and you won't have the overwatering problem. Use a **moisture meter**, a pencil, or your finger to the 2nd knuckle. If it comes up clean, it's time to water. If it's muddy, leave it alone. If you're not sure, wait a day.

Soil Moist Granules This polymer swells up like a sponge and when the soil is dry the stored water is released over an extended period of time. Use in containers or even right in the landscape! It's especially helpful with big leaf plants like cannas, elephant ears, and banana plants. Follow, label instructions and don't over use it or your plant will pop out like a muffin!

Organic Lava Sand and Green Sand have natural moisture retention qualities.

KoKo Pro Coir Bricks This is one of NHG staff's favorites! These shredded coconut bricks work like magic to absorb and release water in our soil and containers.

Gator Bags keep newly planted trees and shrubs properly watered.

Provide supplemental hand watering to new plantings several times a week with water from your tax-free **Rain Barrels**. Do you have a sprinkler system? Water established plantings and turf deeply (1"-2") once a week 6am-8am, rather than watering shorter periods more frequently. **Mulch 2"-3"** to provide consistent moisture and protect your roots. Vegetable gardens will require more frequent watering because plants have shallow root systems. Do you have more questions? Come in and speak with talk to a Garden Advisor if you have specific watering questions. Also look out for classes and pop ups on proper watering and drought tolerant plants through summer!
