

Plant Tulips, Hyacinth and other spring-flowering bulbs between Thanksgiving and the end of December, when soil temps reach 45-50°F. Daffodils, however, can be planted anytime after October 1st through mid January.





## Plant Trees and Shrubs in Winter

Winter is an excellent time to transplant trees and shrubs and plant new ones. Japanese maple not getting enough shade? Need to move roses to a sunnier spot? Now is a great time to move them because growth is minimal and you'll be giving your plants ample time to establish prior to the heat of summer. When moving, cut roots clean (no ripping) and preserve as much of the root ball as possible.

Whether planting from a container or completely relocating, dig the hole at least two times the width of the plant or root ball and the same depth. Use organic **EarthSafe** or **Nature's Guide Root Activator** just after planting and once a month thereafter.

More plant protection year round. We never stop talking about the importance of mulch! A good 2" layer of mulch is a must in the garden this winter. Mulch keeps soil moist, roots warm, reduces weeds and, as an added bonus, breaks down as a natural compost into the soil. NHG carries native east Texas bagged mulches as well as bulk mulch.



# Don't Let Winter Freezes Cause You Stress!

Be prepared with simple techniques to protect your winter garden, you can be ready and relaxed! Healthy, well-maintained plants that have been consistently watered properly are better able to survive freezing temperatures. Some plants will still need to be covered when we dip below 32 degrees including **palms** and annual color such as **cyclamen**. If temperatures drop into the low 20's, cover vegetables such as **lettuce, broccoli, cauliflower** and **Brussels sprouts**.

Correctly applied frost cloth is your best bet for protection. Unlike old blankets or sheets, and burlap, frost cloth is specially designed to trap heat with minimal moisture build-up. It can protect for up to 3 days, and should not be left on longer than this at one time.

# NOW is the TIME...



### NOVEMBER

- O Buy frost cloth to protect tender perennials and other plants from frost and/or freezing
- O **Mulch** all plants well with at least 2 inches of mulch to protect plant roots from cold.
- Select tulips and hyacinths. We pre-chill bulbs for you in our bulb cooler. Tulips and hyacinth should be planted after Thanksgiving and by the end of December. Plant daffodils now through mid-January. Add NHG Organic Bulb Food at planting.
- O Plant winter color: pansies, violas, dianthus, snapdragons, flowering kale and cabbage.
- O Finish dividing and re-planting spring and summer-flowering perennials early November.
- O Plant container trees and shrubs.
- O Using a water can, apply a water-soluble fertilizer like **Hasta-Gro** to newly planted annuals for a quick start.
- O Trim perennials back to the ground as they go dormant.
- O Plant cold-hardy kale, spinach and other cole crops.

## DECEMBER

- O Buy fresh Christmas trees and greens!
- O Remove dead materials that could harbor insects or disease.
- O Plant tulips and hyacinth by the end of the month. Continue planting daffodils. Overplant bulbs with winter color. Apply NHG Organic Bulb Food.
- O Primula and hardy cyclamen can be planted in protected garden areas or pots.
- O Plant container trees and shrubs. Transplanting is best done when plants are dormant.
- Prune summer-flowering shrubs and vines (such as crape myrtles and altheas) lightly to prevent rampant growth in spring. Do not prune springflowering shrubs (azaleas or hydrangeas), vines, or climbing roses until after their spring bloom.
- ${\rm O}$  Don't forget to water trees and shrubs.

Are you outside harvesting your first cool season crops? If not, it's not too late to start. If this is your second planting, remember to amend! Add **Compost** or **Garden Soil Builder**, and additional **Manure** to give these plants the rich, nitrogen based soils they need to thrive and produce. Additional nitrogen in the **NHG 7-2-2** are also helpful.

Kale, Cabbage, as well as most greens, such as Lettuces, Mustard Greens, Collards and Spinach can be planted as available. You can still get in Broccoli, Brussels' Sprouts, Cabbage, Cauliflower, and Kohlrabi until the end of November. As for herbs, I love keeping Parsley coming for an unusually healthy green, and a larval food for my butterfly caterpillars, along with Dills and Fennels. Cilantro is required for those fall tomato salsas you're making. Maybe try something different – most of the leaves of these plants are edible – like Brussels' Sprouts and Beet Greens.

Now, it's time to begin thinking about the cold weather to come. Around here, our average first frost is around the middle of November. Most of these vegetables won't need protection, but if you have Cauliflower, Swiss Chard, the more delicate Lettuces or florets forming on your Broccoli, cover with **Frost Cloth** during a hard freeze. Keep up the **Liquid Seaweed** to help the plants resist cold damage better. Hopefully, you've already got a nice layer of mulch on your garden spaces. Choose from **Pine Bark, Cedar, Hardwood, Pecan Shell,** and **Pine Straw**.

Check for Pests as you go. You might see Aphids during warmer spells, so spray with **Plant Wash** for them. Small holes in greens are caused by Cabbage Looper caterpillars- control with **Bt**, in the form of **liquid Thuricide** or the powder **DiPel dust** for control.

Harvest some of your vegetables and herbs to bring over as a gift to your holiday gatherings. Seeding time will return in January.

Don't forget to leave space for Onions. I'll see you in January for those!
