November

Be certain you have Frost Cloth on hand to protect tender perennials and other plants from frost and freezing.

Be certain that plants are mulched well. At least 2-4 inches of mulch will help protect plant roots from cold temperatures.

Refrigerate tulips and Dutch hyacinths during November (45 days) for late December planting

Plant winter 'color' such as pansies, cyclamen, primrose, flowering kale and cabbage. Finish dividing and replanting spring— and summerflowering perennials early November.

Using a watering can, apply a watersoluble fertilizer to newly planted annuals for a quick start.

Trim perennials back to the ground as they go dormant. Trim tender perennials such as bananas, Mexican bush sage, and lantanas after the first freeze; then mulch them well to protect from cold.

December

Mulch the gardens that you missed last month! Remove dead materials that could harbor insects or disease.

Plant tulips and hyacinths late December. Primulas and hardy cyclamen can be planted in protected garden areas or pots.

Transplanting is best done when plants are dormant.

Prune summer-flowering shrubs and vines (such as crape myrtles and altheas) *lightly* to prevent rampant growth in the spring. NEVER 'TOP'! *Do not* prune spring-flowering shrubs (azaleas), vines, or climbing roses until *after* their spring bloom.

Holidays are for the Birds, Too! By Debbie Jackson

As you make out your holiday lists, don't forget the birds. Birds have basic needs to survive our winter months that we can help provide.

First, they need water. We can provide this by adding birdbaths to our gardens. Be sure to provide fresh water. Second, birds need shelter. We can do this by adding evergreens to our landscape. Some good candidates of evergreens would be junipers, hollies, and nandinas. What you are really looking for is upright shrubs that the birds can use to roost in for the night and get out of the cool night air. Lastly, birds need food. We can accomplish this by providing birdfeeders with different types of food. There are several types of food to choose from including peanuts, sunflower seed, safflower seed, millet, and suet. There is a wide selection of birdfeeders to choose from such as thistle feeders, suet feeders as well as feeders designed to hold peanuts. When making a selection of food or feeder, keep in mind what kind of birds you may want to invite into your yard. For example, cardinals love sunflower seed; so, if you want cardinals to visit your feeders, you will want to use birdseed mix that contains lot s

Be sure to check our selection of books that we carry on birds.

Look for the Sibley Guide to Birds, Birder's Guide to Texas, Birds of Texas, or Field Guide to Birds, all of which we carry in our book department; and add one or more of these to your own personal library of bird identification books this winter.

Camellias, Elegant Denizens of the Winter Garden by Chuck Goecke

Rose-like winter flowers and handsome foliage make Camellias a southern garden classic. *Sasanqua* camellias generally have smaller leaves, a more open form, and somewhat smaller flowers that bloom more in the late fall into the winter. *Japonica* camellias generally have larger leaves on dense, very shapely plants, large flowers of many types and blooms from winter to spring.

Camellias are generally used as larger shrubs or can be pruned into small trees. Plant camellias in very well draining organic acidic soil. Lots of expanded shale should be used to create a raised bed if one is starting with a clay-based soil.

Azaleas and gardenias are great companions, as they all like afternoon shade as well as similar soil and fertilizing (twice in spring, once in early fall).

Winter hardiness is an issue with camellias, more so with their flower buds, than the plant. *Sasanquas* bloom more in fall, thus avoiding the problems. Winter and spring bloomers should be covered during very cold spells, especially if their flower buds are showing color. Keep them well mulched always with hardwood or pine mulch. Poinsettia Care by Don Miller

Keep your poinsettias looking fresh and beautiful throughout the Holiday season with these easy-to-follow steps. Make sure your poinsettias get plenty of bright light Do not let them dry out. If wrapped in foil, don't let them stand in water. Poinsettias do not like cold drafts. Place them clear of heater vents, as these can be drying and cause leaf drop.

Watch for these new varieties this year at North Haven Gardens: 'Strawberries N Cream,' beautiful pink and cream bracts with a serrated edge. 'Cortez Burgundy' has beautiful rich burgundy bracts that contrast with the dark green leaves. 'Da Vinci' has warm pink tones with deep pink flecks. 'Winter Rose' is so-named because the curved bracts give the impression of a rose. These popular varieties come in red, pink, white, and marble.

Bulb Tips Revealed for Spring Plantingby Bob McLaughlin

To replace that beautiful summer color you had, the answer is spring blooming bulbs.

All the nutrition needed is stored in the bulb. Each year during the growing season, the bulb is storing up nearly everything for next year's bloom. It doesn't take much from us to make this happen. The bulb must be planted in loose, well-drained soil, watered and given enough light to make everything else happen.

Basically only two types of bulbs — hyacinths and tulips — should be pre-chilled before planting to make them think they have been through enough winter to grow and bloom. North Haven Gardens pre-chills bulbs in our coolers until planting time (about Dec. 1st). We can supply bulb fertilizer to help the bulbs store food for next year's bloom. Bulbs which will return include daffodils, crocus, hardy amaryllis, and muscari.



North Haven Gardens also carries tulip bulbs that will naturalize here in the Dallas area — Bakeri Lilac Wonder, Tarda Dasystmon, Clusiana, and Pulchella Violaceae.


