However, if not properly handled, the green will soon dry out, along with the fragrance, creating a potential hazard in your home. North Haven Gardens treats all the trees and fresh greens we sell with an anti-transpirant that reduces the moisture loss, but there are several other tips that will help you once you are home. Maintaining fresh water in the tree stand reservoir is critical for your Christmas tree, and should keep it fresh through the holidays. Fresh cut greens should be soaked in water before putting them up for display, and then misted daily or soaked for an hour or so every other day if that is possible. The room your greens are in should be kept as cool as possible, with the greens out of the moving air from vents. Fabulous Winter Color

We are very fortunate to live in North Central Texas with its mild winter temperatures. This gives us the opportunity to grow many colorful plants through the cooler winter months. Pansies and violas are our most reliable winter bloomers. These beauties bring you a continuous show all winter in a rainbow of bright colors. Many people still prefer the large flowered pansies, but with the smaller flowered varieties you get more flowers and they hold up better in the rain. This group would include the Radiance, Nature and Ultima series. There has been a recent trend to plant violas in the pansy beds. They tend to tolerate light shade and pack in many more flowers. Pick one of the two trailing varieties such as 'Purple Rain' (purple) and 'Frosty Rain' (light bluish color) to add to containers and window boxes. Be sure to plant ornamental Kale and Cabbage along with your pansies and violas! The taller varieties are 'Red Bor', 'Peacock Red' and 'Peacock White', these get 18" to 30" tall. One of the brightest short reds (they are more purple than red) is 'Chidori Red'. Other winter favorites include Iceland poppies, primrose, snapdragons and shade-loving cyclamen. All your winter color will benefit with a feeding of NHG Organic Pansy Food or NHG Organic Bedding Food. Happy planting!

NOVEMBER

Buy frost cloth to protect tender perennials and other plants from frost and/or freezing.

Be certain that plants are mulched well. At least 2 inches of mulch will help protect plant roots from cold temperatures.

Select your tulips and hyacinths now. We will pre-chill your bulbs for you in our bulb cooler. Tulips and hyacinth should be planted after Thanksgiving and by the end of December. Plant your daffodils now through mid-January. Mix Bone Meal or NHG Bulb Food into soil when planting daffodils. Attend Bulb Day November 1st.

Plant winter color such as pansies, violas, dianthus, snapdragons, flowering kale and cabbage. Plant cool season herbs like dill and parsley. Finish dividing and re-planting spring and summer-flowering perennials early November. Plant container trees and shrubs.

Using a water can, **apply a water-soluble fertilizer** to newly planted annuals for a quick start.

Trim perennials back to the ground as they go dormant. Trim tender perennials such as bananas, firebush, Mexican heather, Mexican bush sage and lantanas after the first freeze, then mulch them well to protect from cold.

DECEMBER

Mulch the gardens that you missed last month!

Remove dead materials that could harbor insects or disease.

Plant tulips and hyacinth by the end of the month. Continue planting daffodils. Over-plant your bulbs with winter color such as viola and pansy. Primula and hardy cyclamen can be planted in protected garden areas or pots. Apply Bone Meal.

Plant container trees and shrubs. Transplanting is best done when plants are dormant.

Prune summer-flowering shrubs and vines (such as crape myrtles and althaeas) lightly to prevent rampant growth in the spring. Do not prune spring-flowering shrubs (azaleas or hydrangeas), vines, or climbing roses until after their spring bloom.

Don't forget to water trees and shrubs.

Growing Fruit Trees

More and more folks come into our nursery wanting to grow their own food. Planting even one

fruit tree is a small investment that can yield years of delicious fruit for eating and baking. There are many types and varieties of fruit trees that do well in our area. Apple, pear, peach, apricot, plum, persimmon, jujube and fig trees may be planted now. Apple and Asian pear trees should be planted in pairs for adequate cross-pollination for ample fruit production. Peach trees are available in standard and dwarf varieties. 'Celeste', 'Texas Everbearing' and 'Brown Turkey' are excellent fig tree choices. Many of your favorite apples, including 'Red' and 'Golden Delicious', 'Gala', 'Holland', 'Fuji' and 'Granny Smith', are all well suited to our area. Preparing the soil organically is easy and, along with organic methods of pest prevention and fertilization, ensures that you know what is in the fruit you and your family enjoy. Begin by digging a hole that is two times wider than your tree's container and just a little deeper. Plant the tree slightly higher than it was in the container. Drench the root ball with root stimulator before filling the hole with the remaining soil.
