September

Plant cool weather color — petunias, alyssum, dianthus, cyclamen, primrose, flowering kale.

Select and purchase spring-blooming bulbs. The best selections are available now: paperwhites, tulips, hyacinths, and specialty bulbs. We will store bulb purchases of \$100 or more in our cooler until planting time (mid— to late December when soil temperatures are 50° or colder).

The fall is a great time to plant (and transplant) trees and shrubs. Consider adding some natives.

Fertilize lawns, trees, and shrubs at the beginning of September. Between mid-September and October 15, apply corn gluten meal as a weed pre-emergent to *grass areas only*; use 20 lbs. per 1,000 sq. ft; water after applying. *Keep it out of the gardens*. (If you apply the corn gluten, you don't need to fertilize the lawn also.)

Plant leafy green vegetables such as Swiss chard, spinach, lettuce. Also plant onions, broccoli, cabbage and kale.

October

Plant cool weather plants such as mums, pansies, snapdragons, dusty miller, and fragrant stock.

Sew native seeds for spring bloom.

Pick pumpkins for Jack-o-lantern carving and mini-pumpkins and gourds for fall decorating.

Compost those falling leaves! Mulch flower beds in preparation for winter.

Purchase frost cloth to be prepared for unexpected cold weather.

Feed the birds! Safflower seeds are great; squirrels don't like them!

The Amazing Versatility of Containers by Judy Fender

Containers are great for those who don't have room for large gardens, but they can also be used as accents on patios and in the garden as well. You can create a container garden quickly, putting a lot of interest and color into a small forgotten space. Just about any plant can be planted in a container. If you have an exotic plant, it can be moved inside for winter when the temperatures are threatening. Bonsai collections are grown in containers. Hanging basket containers allow for plants to be hung where they wouldn't normally be 'found' — in the air! Annuals, perennials, and vines all can find homes in containers. Plants can be changed each season if containers are host to annuals. Create a container filled with fall chrysanthemum blooms to brighten up your patio or entryway.

Consider layering bulbs in a ceramic container for continued [forced] winter or spring bloom that changes every few weeks. Daffodils, tulips, crocus, and hyacinths make outstanding displays in containers both outside and inside. Fall is the time to create!

Use discarded items like old porcelain tubs or pans as container accents in a garden, filled with colorful plants to attract subtle attention. Drill holes in the bottom of pots and pans for drainage purposes; then, fill them with herbs and arrange them near the back door so they are easily accessible from the kitchen. (Chives, garlic, parsley, rosemary and thyme are the most adaptable to inside sunny winter windowsills.)

Outside, consider miniature roses in pots to enhance a sunny patio table or step. Inside, consider planting begonias or violets in attractive ceramic containers with saucers.

Remember, when making your plant selections to choose plants that will "play well" together in the same container! Keep the thirsty ones together and the drought tolerant ones away from them! Fertilize monthly and don't over water, but keep them happy!

Water Garden Activities by Debbie Jackson
Mosquitoes are a reason for concern recently. Koi, goldfish, and gambusia (mosquito fish) love to eat mosquito larvae (and any other insects) that might land in a water garden. For those without fish ponds, Mosquito Dunks will prevent mosquito populations from thriving in water containers. Mosquito dunks are organic and target just the mosquito's larval stage. Each dunk treats up to 100 sq. ft. of water surface (where the larvae live). The dunks do not harm birds or fish, and they have a very long "shelf life," according to the manufacturer; so keep plenty on hand for water areas outside.

Dragonflies — nature's helicopters — are great hunters, grabbing mosquitoes and flies from the air. The dragonfly's 2-year larval stage is spent in the pond where they also feed on mosquito larvae.


