FALL CONTAINERS

Plants Have Personalities, Too! Judy Fender

Plants in containers are not only beautiful, but can also define areas and add color to dull spots. Favorite plants love containers for protection from pets. Pot designs are fast and easy to put together, just add soil and plants. Containers are easily moved to new locations for change and variety.

Attract hummingbirds to your fall sun garden with the red flowers of the cypress vine, planted in a mid-size pot; then, add an oblisk for it to climb on and watch the


hummers' delight! Fall annuals such as Purple Fountain Grass, yellow or mauve chrysanthemums, coleus and potato vine combine to give height and trailing interest to a sunny spot.

A large bowl container planted with Japanese painted ferns, Autumn fern, cyclamen and/or primrose and an ivy to trail will brighten any shady garden and grow well into the winter.

Can't remember to fertilize? Use Osmocote, which will easily keep plants fed for 3-4 months. Add a finishing touch of pine bark mulch to keep soil from bouncing out of pots when you water or when it rains. Mulch will also help retain a bit of moisture in the containers. Remember to check the soil before you water (use your finger to

check), and water only when necessary, not on a schedule.

With a little bit of care, your containers will perform beautifully for you! You might be so thrilled that you treat them to a pot whimsy (butterfly, dragonfly, or toad accent).

Getting your lawn ready for its winter dormancy will require some fall planning. As elementary as it might sound, the length of your grass blades has a direct effect on lawn health. Taller leaf blades can increase a lawn's tolerance to cold, promotes deeper root growth and winter protection. You might want to raise the mower blade height up by 1/2" as you get into the fall season. If you mow more than 1/3 of your leaf height, you take valuable protein from your grass.

If you have a mulching mower this will pulverize the grass and leaves into smaller pieces for faster decomposition. If not, you need to rake the whole leaves since they can pack down and smother the grass leading to cool weather diseases and greater weed problems in the spring. Don't forget to water your lawn when it needs it, even in the winter.

Fertilize your lawn with a complete fertilizer, such as the NHG 21-7-14 or Texas Tee 6-2-4 in early September. Between mid-September and October 15, apply corn gluten meal as a weed pre-emergent to grass areas only; use 20 lbs. per 1,000 sq. ft. Water after applying.

Don't Throw in the Trowel

Even though summer is almost over and gardeners are weary, don't throw in the trowel! Many of our perennial herbs will put on fresh new growth as the nights cool down. It's time to harvest that bounty by drying, freezing, making vinegars and potpourri, saving seeds, and gathering bouquets of beautiful blooms of pineapple sage and mint marigold. Since the holiday season is closer than you think, take advantage of this harvest to prepare unique and inexpensive gifts from the garden. Don't forget that your basil will soon bid adieu, so process the leaves in a small amount of olive oil (similar to a pesto) and freeze the herbal concentrate for use this winter. Be sure to save a place for those herbs that thrive in cooler weather: cilantro, dill, chervil, borage, arugula, and parsley. Mid-October is a good time to plant garlic cloves, shallots and elephant garlic. Summer may be winding down, but the herb garden keeps our enthusiasm up!

Corn Gluten Meal: The Organic Weed-n-Feed Christine Hensley

If you are looking for an organic method to control weeds in your lawn, try Corn Gluten Meal. It is a by-product of the corn milling industry and is used for animal feed. It works for weed control by inhibiting root formation in newly emerging seedlings. After a short period of water stress the weed seedlings die. Corn gluten meal does not have a detrimental effect on existing plants; it actually contains around 9% nitrogen, so it is a nice mild organic fertilizer for your lawn and ornamentals. However, do not use corn gluten meal in vegetable beds or anywhere you would sow seeds! It comes in 2 forms, spreadable and powdered. The powder provides the best coverage, but it can get quite messy if there is a breeze. The spreadable is pelletized so it falls to the ground better. Apply at 20 lbs. per 1000 sq. ft. and water thoroughly after application. Apply seasonally in the early spring and early fall to catch those weeds as they sprout. Each application is effective for 3 months.

Now is the Time...

SEPTEMBER

Plant cool weather color — petunias, alyssum, dianthus, cyclamen, primrose, flowering kale.

Select and purchase spring-blooming bulbs. The best selections are available now: paperwhites, tulips, hyacinths, and specialty bulbs. We will store bulb purchases of \$100 or more in our cooler until planting time (Between November 25th and December 25th, when soil temperatures are 50° or colder).

The fall is a great time to plant (and transplant) trees and shrubs. Consider adding some natives.



Plant leafy green vegetables such as Swiss chard, spinach and lettuce. Also plant onions, broccoli, cabbage and kale.

Fertilize lawns, trees, and shrubs at the beginning of September. Between mid-September and October 15, apply corn gluten meal as a weed pre-emergent in your lawn. Use 20 lbs. per 1,000 sq. ft. Water after applying. If you apply the corn gluten, you don't need to fertilize the lawn also.

OCTOBER

Plant cool weather plants such as mums, pansies, snapdragons, dusty miller and fragrant stock.

Sow native seeds for spring bloom.

Pick pumpkins for Jack-o-lantern carving and mini-pumpkins and gourds for fall decorating.

Compost those falling leaves! Mulch flowerbeds in preparation for winter.

Purchase frost cloth to be prepared for unexpected cold weather.

Feed the birds! Safflower seeds are great, plus the squirrels don't like them!
