Y Leeks

Leeks are a member of the onion family, but they do not form bulbs. Slips arrive in early January. Grow them similarly to the way you would onions.



Plant onion slips in January. They are ready to harvest when the temperatures rise, usually in May.

Tomatoes

If you plan to start from seed to grow more varieties, you should begin in January. Transplants go in the ground late February to mid-March in order to get them established and bushy before the optimum temperature time frame for fruit set, which is typically in April through early May.

▼ Asparagus

Plant crowns in February. This perennial crop is an investment of time and space, but well worth the reward.



February

Plant seed potatoes in February into rich, well drained soil. Dusting sulfur helps to protect from fungal growth.

M Rhubarb

While it requires extra care due to our hot summers, it's well worth the effort: the edible stalks add a delicious, fruity flavor that's truly unique.

M Horseradish

An easy crop to grow. The hot, zesty punch of flavor fresh from the garden is unbeatable.
