Wonderful Hardy Water Lilies



Ready to try something new this summer? Start a patio water garden! In the heat of summer, water lilies will bloom beautifully in a container on your patio. Hardy lilies come in a variety of colors, from pale yellow to bright pink, with glossy-green, rounded leaves that

offer lots of shade to the creatures that live beneath them in ponds and bogs. Start with a colorful pot at least 18-inches deep and wide enough to allow the water lily to spread out. Fill the bottom of the pot with several inches of heavy garden soil mixed with a bit of sand and fertilizer, and fill with water.

Treat the water with a dechlorinator prior to adding plants. Or, let the water sit for a few days before adding your lilies. Plant the lily by simply placing the potted lily into the water



Summer Safety

Summer can still be a rewarding time to work in the garden when you stay healthy and prepared. Most important, drink plenty of water. The experts say that if you wait until you are thirsty, you are waiting too long. Be sure to apply a good bit of sunblock and wear a hat. If you start feeling light-headed, stop working and move to the shade to cool down. Try getting out early in the morning when temperatures are at their coolest. Dallas MANDATORY Watering Guidelines

June 1 to Sept. 30, watering of lawns or landscapes with an irrigation system or sprinkler is prohibited between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. Watering with a hand-held hose or a soaker hose is permitted at any time. Don't allow your sprinkler system to water driveways, sidewalks and streets. Do not water or irrigate lawns or landscapes during any form of precipitation. Rain/freeze sensors are now required on all irrigation systems installed on or after Jan. 1, 2002. As of January 1, 2005 all irrigation systems must be equipped with rain sensing devices and freeze gauges. Violations of these outdoor watering guidelines can now result in fines of \$250 to \$2,000 per incident. For water conservation information, call 214-670-3155.






Spring Blooming Bulbs Arrive Soon!

Starting in September, spring blooming bulbs will begin to arrive. This is an exciting time at North Haven Gardens and many of our customers start planning their spring gardens now! We will have dozens of varieties of Daffodils, Tulips, Hyacinth and many other specialty bulbs. Plus, we are the only Garden Center in town that will store and pre-chill your bulbs for you! When you purchase \$100 worth of bulbs, we'll store them for you at just the right temperature for just the right time. We'll call you at the beginning of December to let you know when it's time to pick up your bulbs. Or, we can offer you the best advice on how to chill them at home until planting time. The most beautiful blooms come from healthy bulbs, which need to be stored and planted properly for the best success. When exactly is the right time to plant? When the soil temperature drops below 50°F. The basic guidelines are: Don't plant your tulips and hyacinth before Thanksgiving and get them in the ground by the end of December. Daffodils, however, can be planted anytime after October 1st and through mid-January. *Be sure to shop early for the best selection of spring blooming bulbs in town! Popular varieties sell quickly. Mulch Reminder

Mulch, mulch, mulch! Always remember to re-apply mulch each season. Especially in the summer! Mulch retains moisture, meaning you will water less and reduce your water bill. It also protects the roots from extreme heat and cold. Plants will be saved season after season. Over time, mulch breaks down into the soil, adding nutrients and enriching the soil. Heat Loving Perennial Color!

July and August in Texas means the heat is upon us. But, that doesn't mean we can't enjoy our garden as if it were spring! Plant these heat-loving perennials for their color, strength and water-friendly habits. To get even more mileage from your summer garden perennials, you'll want to follow a good fertilization program. Fish Emulsion or Seaweed are great foliar feeds. Top-dressing with a slow release fertilizer two or three times per year will keep your flowering plants looking their best. "Deadheading" is another technique you can use to extend the blooming period. By removing spent flowers before they go to seed, you can encourage the plant to produce more new blooms.

J U L Y

Plant: Tomatoes early in July for fall production and plant pumpkins and gourds for fall harvest. Plant peppers about mid-July for fall production.

Fertilize: Feed container plants and roses regularly and watch for insect and disease problems. We carry a full line of rose care products, including organics.

Water: Learn your city's water regulations. Water deeply when you water your lawn. See page 1 for more tips. Water container plants as needed.

Pest control: Use BT for caterpillars, blast aphids with water, and release ladybugs.

Disease control: Spray Neem oil or potassium bicarbonate or horticultural oil for control of black spot, powdery mildew and other fungal diseases.

Attend NHG Native Wildflower lecture to prepare for planting in August.

A U G U S T

Plant: Fall-flowering bulbs, fall annuals (marigolds, zinnias, celosias) and perennials (Mexican bush sage, fall asters). Plant wildflower seeds late in the month to allow for germination and growth prior to winter. Plant beans and squash early in the month; cucumbers, broccoli, cabbage, and cauliflower about mid-month. Plant leafy crops late in August.

Roses: Lightly prune and feed roses to encourage fall blooms.

Pests: Spray horticultural oil or orange oil for spider mites, lace bugs, thrips, and scale.

Mulch, mulch, mulch to keep in moisture and protect against harsh, hot temperatures this summer.
